Course Descriptions

Course Catalog Description: Writing course with a focus on learning and using a variety of tools available within contemporary digital composing environments. Prerequisite: ENG 21011 or HONR 10297.

Specific Course Focus: Tools for the following types of digital media will be explored: document construction, video construction, image construction, audio construction. We will focus on ways that these media converge. We will also address accessibility, security, and copyright issues. Finally, we will explore the ways that written expressions have been affected by the Digital Age.

Learning Outcomes

- Appreciate the differences between rhetoric and other types of writing.
- Explore the ways that digital writing and rhetoric both interact and collide with other digital expressions.
- Understand "appropriate" rhetorical and other writing usages and differences for a wide variety of media, as well as combinations of media (multimodal, multimedia).
- Appreciate what it means to hold private and public discourse in the World Wide Web, and the rhetorical implications.
- Explore creative ways of using digital technology for rhetorical and other writing purposes for larger applications.
- Develop basic skills for at least the following:
 - \circ document construction
 - $^\circ$ $\,$ video construction from/with/for writing and rhetoric
 - $^\circ$ $\,$ image construction from/with/for writing and rhetoric $\,$
 - $^\circ$ $\,$ audio construction from/with/for writing and rhetoric.
- Develop media literacy skills, including an appreciation for the variety of formats of media (e.g., the different formats for documents, such as docx, txt, html, etc.).

- Develop skills for appreciating legal issues, such as the importance of privacy and security, the differences between copyright and fair use, and the dangers of defamation, libel, and slander.
- Develop skills for building a blog.
- Develop skills for building a web site.
- Develop skills for understanding the differences between a static web page and a dynamic web page.
- Develop skills for understanding the basic concepts and philosophy of content management systems (CMS).
- Gain an understanding for why and how WYSIWYG is a manageable lie.
- Gain an understanding between: proprietary software, open-source proprietary software, open-source free software.
- Develop an appreciation for the advantages and disadvantages of various social media.

the lost points for failing to meet during that Mandatory Conference or Tutorial period will not be regained. Each conference or tutorial is worth 25 points (2.5%)—no more, no less.

Course Grades

No grade ever goes above the level of an A+ (never above 100/100 possible points, for example); likewise, no graded work ever goes below the upper level of an F points (never below 55/100 points, for example); however, if an assignment is never submitted, or is submitted too late to be graded, it will receive ZERO points. If your final course score is 64-63%, you will earn a D for the course; if your final course score is 62-60%, you will earn an F for the course. All assignments will be weighted according to the percentage value. All assignments will be evaluated on a 100 point scale as follows:

No grade for submitted work ever goes above an \underline{A} (100, 60, 50 or 40 points); likewise, no graded work ever goes below an \underline{F} (55, 33, 27, points; however, if an assignment is never submitted, or if it is submitted too late to be graded, it will receive ZERO points.

Regarding Missed, Late, or Incomplete Work

With the exception of Mandatory Conferences and Writing Workshop assignments, late work will be accepted for a period of time after the due date; however, points will be deducted for late submissions. For each day the work is late: 3% (3 out of a possible 100 points, 6 out of a possible 200 points) will be deducted from the grade. No late work will be accepted if shared eight days or later past the due date, and no work will be accepted after May 8, 2021. **Essay Rewrites will not be accepted in place of un-submitted essays**.
